## **Coalfield Regeneration Trust**



CRT is actively encouraging small voluntary and community groups to come forward with their ideas for funding under its Level 1 grant scheme.

The scheme allows for capital or revenue funding up to a maximum of £5,000 for projects in eligible coalfield areas with high levels of deprivation.

The fund is currently undersubscribed and the regional office will gladly assist applicants to determine if they have a project that fits with CRT criteria.

So far in the current funding round, projects like Bulwell Boxing Club, Newton Methodist Church, Clipstone Youth Centre Play scheme,

and Fifth Word Theatre have all benefited from grant awards that enable them to provide improved services and projects for their communities.

CRT cannot fund salaries under this scheme but it can support the use of Sessional workers to deliver projects that provide local community benefits. It can support training for volunteers and host groups, and can also support purchasing of equipment and small refurbishment projects.

### **Derbyshire Community Action Grant**

Are you a group with a great idea to improve your local community? Do you need a small amount of money to make it happen?

Dozens of clubs and groups are benefiting from our Big Society community funding schemes.

We have already boosted dozens of groups with our £250,000 Community Action Grant fund launched last summer offering 'small groups with big ideas' up to £1,000.

So far we've handed out more than £163,000 to boost local groups and applications are now being invited for the sixth round which closes on 14 December 2012

### **RBS Inspiring Enterprise Programme to Benefit Young People**

The Royal Bank of Scotland (RBS) Group has launched a new three-year funding programme which will focus on young people, women and social entrepreneurs in the UK.

RBS will provide a funding pot of £1.5 million over the next three years for the Youth Enterprise programme. Non-profit organisations in the UK can apply now for grants of up to £50,000 for projects that provide enterprise support to young people between the ages of 13 and 30 years. Applications can be for both new and existing programmes that are helping young people on their enterprise journey. This might be helping them to set up in business, delivering enterprise education, innovative networking events, developing entrepreneurial knowledge and skills, and more.

There will be two funding rounds per year for the next three years. Each year some £500,000 will be available.

In addition to the funding, the RBS Group says that "all successful applicants will be given the opportunity to take advantage of a range of additional benefits including accessing network and partnership events, and working with the Inspiring Enterprise team to help promote our partnership and the impact it's making."

By the time the Inspiring Youth Enterprise programme ends in 2015, RBS expects to have helped 100,000 young people to explore enterprise, develop their enterprising skills and start up in business.

RBS is also running a series of workshops with the RSA (Royal Society for the encouragement of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce) to bring young people together with enterprise support organisations.

# AVCVS BEFRIENDING SERVICE

#### An All Round Valuable Service

As it was once famously said "It's good to talk", but for those isolated members of society, good company can be hard to come by.

We have been running our befriending service for over ten years now, with an aim to provide the most socially isolated residents of Amber Valley with a friendly face and a listening ear.

One of those residents is Mr Bartle, who has been having regular befriending visits from Ray an Amber Valley CVS trained befriender, Ray was matched with Mr Bartle earlier this year and has been visiting him regularly ever since.

Mr. Bartle lost his wife in 2005 and due to health conditions he currently has difficulty getting around, but his regular visits from Ray have given him back the social contact that many of us take for granted.

Mr Bartle said of the service "There are people lying in bungalows and they have no one come to see them... ...but if a befriender comes round it gives them courage and it breaks the monotony"

The befriending service is not only valuable to Mr Bartle but also to Ray. Since retiring Ray found he had extra time, so decided to join us as a volunteer befriender, since when, he has seen the real worth of what volunteers can provide for people like Mr. Bartle.

Ray commented: "I enjoy coming to see the fella...... It gives him something to fight for"

### **Member Focus - Belper Amateurs Cricket Club**

Belper Amateurs are a local cricket club who have teams of participants aged 8 to 80.

The club runs sessions for Kwik cricket under 11's, under 12's, under 13's, under 15's, under 17's and two senior sides in the Derbyshire Cricket league.

They also provide coaching for young players and organise fundraising / social events, for example pub six-a-sides, raffles and quizzes.

The club have received support from our Community Funding and Development Worker, Collette Watson. Collette has assisted the group with funding advice and possible funding streams. Collette has also completed a 'Health Check' for the group to establish if all the correct policies and procedures are in place.

The club have sent Amber Valley CVS the following statement with regards to the support they have received.

"As a new member of Amber Valley CVS, Belper Amateurs has not only benefited from the sound advice received regarding funding applications, but has also been lucky to receive a £238 financial award. This money has been used to equip our junior cricket programme with training equipment"

"Thanks to Collette Watson the Community Funding and Development Worker we have managed to successfully apply for over £2000 worth of funding in 2012. Which means over the winter two of our members are training to be ECB level one coaches, so we can potentially quadruple the amount of organised coaching sessions in 2013"

"Our association with the CVS in 2012 has helped us to restructure and modernise our club as we now have minuted committee meetings, a new constitution, equality and child welfare policies without which we would not be in a position to ask for financial support in the future"

"All that is left to say is a big thank you on behalf of Belper Amateurs CC to Collette and the CVS team for their support in 2012"

## **Current Opportunities**



URGENT REQUEST - With 70+ people still on our waiting list to have a Befriender, we are always looking for new recruits. So if you have 1-2 hours a week to spare to be a listening ear for an elderly person in your area, please get in touch!

Marlpool lunch club - We are looking for a caring person of any age to help out with Front of House work getting the tables ready for meals for 35 elderly people every Wednesday. Volunteers are needed from 10am to 12.30pm.



We need someone who likes working with the elderly and also has time for those who are disabled. The person would be required to assist with the table setting, help waitressing and then clearing up or stay to help with a 1 hour activity. Drivers to assist at times would also be useful to the Club.

Ashmere Care Home - Do you have any talents, skills or hobbies you could share with our residents? If you could spare one hour to come along and chat or read to residents, play games or teach them new skills then please get in touch through the Volunteer Centre. Our residents enjoy any kind of company and it is good for them to see people from the community.



Tootsies - Join our friendly team of footcare volunteers and staff working in a variety of community venues throughout the Amber Valley area. You will be provided with basic footcare training from a local NHS Podiatrist and an induction from Age UK staff. Volunteers are required to take part in the footcare sessions where duties involve meeting and greeting clients, administrative tasks such as taking bookings and payments, delivering footcare (Foot assessment, a foot soak, nail cutting and filing and foot massage) and generally providing a warm, welcoming social

environment for clients.

Autumn Club - A Treasurer is required to collect money for tea, raffles and trips. You would need to be organised, methodical, accurate and reliable. We need a social person who can relate to elderly people and have empathy and understanding along with a good sense of humour. Keeping records of all monies, bank records etc is an essential part of the role.

Home-Start Amber Valley is affiliated to Home-Start UK and recruits and trains volunteers to support parents with young children at home. Volunteer Trustee members provide support, direction and cohesion for a small staff group who co-ordinate a group of volunteers who in turn provide support for families.

Being a Trustee can be hard work but is also rewarding, giving many chances for personal development and the opportunity to give something back to your community. How much of your time it will take can vary, especially if you take on additional commitments but on average it will be around 8 hours per month. You will be offered an induction and may be required to have a criminal records check.

**Heanor Festival Trust** - A volunteer is needed to record the minutes and ensure meetings are arranged when required and to act as right hand person to the Chair. If you have good communication skills, particularly in writing letters and record keeping, we'd like to hear from you.

We also need someone to keep our bank records up to date as a Treasurer and assist in their preparation for Audit.

This could be an ideal opportunity to make new friends with similar interests and help plan for future festival events.



**Community Communicator** – We are looking for residents in Aldercar and Langley Mill who will act as trusted contacts and go-between for their neighbours, neighbourhoods, the parish council and other statutory agencies active in Aldercar and Langley Mill. # Important Changes

## Find out how these changes will affect your Organisation

The Government have scaled back the criminal records and barring systems to more proportionate levels whilst ensuring that they continue to provide effective protection for those who need it.

There is now a new definition of regulated activity and removal of controlled activity.

The Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006 sets out the activities and work which are 'regulated activity', which a person who has been barred by the ISA must not do. They have scaled back regulated activity to focus on work which involves close and unsupervised contact with vulnerable groups including children.

The activities and work which have been taken out of regulated activity will still be eligible for enhanced CRB checks but they will no longer be eligible for barred list checks.

It is VITAL that you are aware of these important changes which the Government have made to criminal records and barring arrangements and how they will affect you.

# **DERBYSHIRE LINK**

## **Derbyshire LINk/Healthwatch Derbyshire Update**



As of 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013, Derbyshire LINk as you know it will no longer exist. There will be a new independent consumer champion, Healthwatch Derbyshire, for patients and users of health and social care services.

Healthwatch Derbyshire (HWD) will build on the knowledge and experience of Derbyshire LINk and ensure that the existing priorities and responsibilities of LINk are maintained, such as:-

- Promoting patient and public involvement (PPI).
- Seeking people's views on services which can be fed back into the development and delivery of local health and social care services.
- The right to enter and view provider services (and children's health services).
- Ability to comment on changes to local services.

Healthwatch will have a statutory seat on the Health and Wellbeing Board, which is currently established in shadow form and at which Derbyshire LINk currently have a seat. However, Healthwatch will have additional responsibilities to those of LINk which include:-

- Facilitating access to a complaints advocacy service to support people who make complaints about NHS services.
- Provide a signposting service to help people access and make choices about their care.

Derbyshire County Council has a statutory duty to commission an efficient and effective Healthwatch Derbyshire. The Council therefore advertised for organisations to provide a quote to deliver an implementation project, as they considered this the best way



to achieve an independent and impartial organisation.

The successful applicant demonstrated a proven ability and track record to complete projects to the required standards within agreed deadlines and budgets. As a consequence the Council has engaged Exact Consultants Ltd and they will be responsible for:-

- Recruiting the HWD Executive Board.
- Setting up HWD to be operational by 1 April 2013.

The application process to join the Executive Board is being widely advertised during November 2012, and it is hoped that individuals who have the skills and experience to engage in the delivery of HWD will submit their applications.

The Council and Exact Consultants Ltd will continue to work with the Chair and Vice Chair of the current Derbyshire LINk Steering Group. All existing LINk members and volunteers are encouraged to continue their involvement into HWD to support the task of improving how local people can influence, challenge and get involved in the planning of their health and social care services.

We continue to deliver the Domestic Abuse schools awareness programme throughout the Amber Valley and Erewash area to Yr 8 students in secondary schools.

### **AVEDASS Good News Story**

A six year old boy was referred to AVEDASS by Social Care. He lived with his mother and father and had an elder step-sister and step brother who lived independently. Other statutory agencies were involved. We were told that the young boy didn't talk to the agencies and presented with multi-problems which included:-

- Speech Impairment
- Lack of concentration
- No writing skills
- Toileting issues

- Wouldn't sit still in class
- Aggressive towards students
- Not meeting expected standards for age
- Tired and yawning in class

The boy's mother used to drink but would not admit to having a problem with alcohol.

His mother and father would get into drink-induced arguments and fights and he had heard and witnessed these. His father was serving a 3 month sentence for threatening behaviour and since his father's imprisonment both his and his mother's behaviour had become worse.

During our time with the boy we built up a trust and he told us that his mother had told him not to talk to agencies. He was not allowed to socialise outside school and spent his entire time in front of the TV on the games console. The mother did not do any activities with him and he was rarely bathed. He ate with a spoon and his fine motor skills had suffered because he had not been shown how to use implements such as a tooth brush, pencil and cutlery. In the school holidays he did not go to the park, take holidays or go out of the house.

The boy's father was released from prison and the fights started again. Eventually, after unexplained absences from school and concern over the lack of care, he was removed from the family and placed with foster parents.

He is now thriving with his new foster parents. He is still behind on his school work but now attends regularly. He attends various clubs and is beginning to learn to socialise. He has gained weight and his health is better. His speech is better and he sees a speech therapist regularly. He enjoys trying new things and very rarely asks about his parents who he has arranged visits with fortnightly but they do not always turn up.

## **Board & Committee Members Required for Credit Union**



The largest credit union in Derbyshire is looking to recruit some new blood to help it as it continues to grow.

Erewash Credit Union needs new directors for its board and members of its supervisory committee.

Based in Ilkeston, Erewash Credit Union now covers the whole of Derbyshire, including the City of Derby, and has offices in Ripley, Heanor, Alfreton and Long Eaton.

A financial co-operative, which operates similar to a bank, it is owned and run by its members. ECU is the third largest community financial co-operative in the East Midlands.

As with other credit unions, it has expanded rapidly and developed products and services to meet the current needs of people living and working in Derbyshire.

It has 2,800 members and each year deals in £1.5m of loans to members at a low rate of interest.

It needs up to three new directors – people who live or work in the county and have experience of accounting, business planning, human resources, developing policy and procedures, governance, marketing, and partnership working.

At least three members are needed for the supervisory committee which ensures that staff and volunteers abide by the board's policies. They should have experience in checking numerical and written data or experience of internal auditing.

The board and committee meet once a month, usually in Ilkeston, and members would be asked to spare up to five hours a month. Full training and support is provided and reasonable expenses may be claimed.

"It's important that we have a group of people with as wide an experience as possible to continue the smooth running of the credit union," said manager Seamus Grant.

## Fee for intervention - What you need to know

If you are breaking health and safety laws, HSE may recover its costs from you by charging a fee for the time and effort it spends on helping you to put the matter right, investigating and taking enforcement action.

#### What is fee for intervention (FFI)?

HSE's inspectors inspect work activities and investigate incidents and complaints. If, when visiting your business, they see material breaches of the law, you will have to pay a fee. The fee is based on the amount of time that the inspector has had to spend identifying the breach, helping you to put it right, investigating and taking enforcement action.

#### Will FFI apply to me?

If you comply with the law you won't pay a fee.

FFI only applies to work carried out by HSE's inspectors so if your business is inspected for health and safety by another regulator, such as local authority environmental health officers, it will not apply.

FFI will apply to all businesses and organisations inspected by HSE, except for:

- self-employed people who don't put people at risk by their work;
- those who are already paying fees to HSE for the work through other arrangements;
   and
- those who deliberately work with certain biological agents.

### **Headway North Derbyshire**

Headway – the brain injury association is the leading UK charity providing support and information to adults with an acquired brain injury, their families and carers. Headway also supports professionals who work with them.

Depending on local needs and resources, a network of local groups and branches throughout the UK offer a range of services including rehabilitation programmes, carer support, social reintegration and community outreach. The local groups and branches are provided with support from Headway UK through guidance on policies, procedures and training.

Headway North Derbyshire, formerly known as Headway Chesterfield, is a branch of Headway UK, managed and operated by a team of volunteers, many of whose lives have been affected in some way by brain injury. Our membership includes brain injury survivors, carers and families plus professional workers.

We hold a social meeting on the second Wednesday of each month at St. Michael's Church Hall, Brimington from 7-9pm. Other social and recreational events we provide include – Ten Pin Bowling, Complementary Therapy, Indoor and Outdoor Leisure Activities and Outings.

A dedicated telephone helpline operated by our branch responds to calls for advice and support from family members, survivors and workers, thereby adding local value to the national helpline operated by Headway UK.

News and information is regularly circulated through our monthly newsletter, a service that is both welcomed and relied upon, particularly by our survivor members.

We have active an relationship with the Clay Cross Hospital based Brain Injury Service whose role is to ensure that people with Acquired Brain Injury



receive an appropriate level of support and rehabilitation when it is most needed. Other groups that we liaise and work with to promote the needs of people affected by brain injury include, Adult Social Care, GP's, Local Authorities and of course NDVA.

Our ongoing aims include:

- To campaign for better service provision for brain injury survivors, their carers and families.
- To raise more public awareness of brain injury issues including prevention and safety.
- To promote an information and signposting service for such topics as Welfare Benefits, Access to Services, Legal Matters and Health issues related to brain injury.
- To develop our social rehabilitation services to a wider catchment area in North Derbyshire. This will be supported by the steps we are taking to improve our fundraising position and realise our ambition to employ our own development worker.
